Subject: Request to apply the Per Capita Grant (Proposition 68) to the past community center

remodel project

## **Recommendation:**

Approve Resolution No. 2021-18 approving the application for the per capita grant funds to be used for the past community center remodel project. The per capita grant funds can be applied retroactively for capital projects that started any time after July, 2018.

## **Rationale for Recommendation:**

The deadline to have a new project proposal submitted for use of the Per Capita Grant funds is December 31, 2021. With all the staff changes, it might pose a challenge to develop an entirely new project that qualifies to use these grant funds. Staff has done research and has found that parts of the community center project completed in June 2020 qualify for use with this grant. Staff recommends using the community center project so that these funds are not lost. The board can decide not to use these funds towards the past community center project; however, a new project must be developed and submitted no later than the above stated December 31, 2021 deadline.

## **Background:**

The Per Capita Program is a grant program under the California State Parks Department. This program originates from Proposition 68, placed on the ballot via Senate Bill 5 (DeLeon, Chapter 852, statutes of 2017), and approved by voters on June 5, 2018. Funds for this program were appropriated via State Budget item 3790-101-6088(b). Legislative program information is found in the Public Resources Code (PRC) beginning at §80000. The Office of Grants and Local Services Mission (OGALS) retains the right to waive requirements not mandated by statute. Funds are provided for two programs, as described below:

General Per Capita Program: \$185,000,000

Funds are available for local park rehabilitation, creation, and improvement grants to local governments on a per capita basis. Grant recipients are encouraged to utilize awards to rehabilitate existing infrastructure and to address deficiencies in neighborhoods lacking access to the outdoors (PRC §80061(a)).

## **Discussion and Analysis:**

Staff has been working with a project officer, Erin Spencer Parks, from the Office of Grants and Local Services. Together, they have determined that parts of the community center project will qualify for the grant funding and will have no problem reaching the total awarded amount of \$181,055.

## **Fiscal Impact:**

The total amount of the grant award is \$181,055. \$177,952 is the amount awarded to Kensington Community Services District with an additional \$3,103 since the district resides in an urban county for a total grant award of \$181,055. Since the district is not in a low income area there is a required match of 25% or \$45,463. This will not pose any issues as the total amount of the community center renovation project will meet this match requirement.

#### **RESOLUTION NO. 2021-18**

## A RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE KENSINGTON POLICE PROTECTION AND COMMUNITY SERVICES DISTRICT APPROVING APPLICATIONS FOR THE PER CAPITA GRANT FUNDS

The Board of Directors of the Kensington Police Protection and Community Services District "Board of Directors") does find as follows:

WHEREAS, the State Department of Parks and Recreation has been delegated the responsibility by the Legislature of the State of California for the administration of the Per Capita Grant Program, setting up necessary procedures governing application(s); and

WHEREAS, said procedures established by the State Department of Parks and Recreation require the grantee's Governing Body to certify by resolution the approval of project application(s) before submission of said applications to the State; and

WHEREAS, the grantee will enter into a contract(s) with the State of California to complete project(s);

NOW, THEREFORE, THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS DOES RESOLVE AS FOLLOWS:

- 1. Approves the filing of project application(s) for Per Capita program grant project(s); and
- 2. Certifies that said grantee has or will have available, prior to commencement of project work utilizing Per Capita funding, sufficient funds to complete the project(s); and
- 3. Certifies that the grantee has or will have sufficient funds to operate and maintain the project(s), and
- 4. Certifies that all projects proposed will be consistent with the park and recreation element of Kensington residing within Contra Costa County, general or recreation plan (PRC §80063(a)), and
- 5. Certifies that these funds will be used to supplement, not supplant, local revenues in existence as of June 5, 2018 (PRC §80062(d)), and
- 6. Certifies that it will comply with the provisions of §1771.5 of the State Labor Code, and (PRC §80001(b)(8)(A-G)). To the extent practicable, as identified in the "Presidential Memorandum--Promoting Diversity and Inclusion in Our National Parks, National Forests, and Other Public Lands and Waters," dated January 12, 2017, Kensington residing within Contra Costa County, will consider a range of actions that include, but are not limited to, the following:
  - a) Conducting active outreach to diverse populations, particularly minority, low- income, and disabled populations and tribal communities, to increase awareness within those communities and the public generally about specific programs and opportunities.
  - b) Mentoring new environmental, outdoor recreation, and conservation leaders to increase

- diverse representation across these areas.
- c) Creating new partnerships with state, local, tribal, private, and nonprofit organizations to expand access for diverse populations.
- d) Identifying and implementing improvements to existing programs to increase visitation and access by diverse populations, particularly minority, low-income, and disabled populations and tribal communities.
- e) Expanding the use of multilingual and culturally appropriate materials in public communications and educational strategies, including through social media strategies, as appropriate, that target diverse populations.
- f) Developing or expanding coordinated efforts to promote youth engagement and empowerment, including fostering new partnerships with diversity-serving and youth-serving organizations, urban areas, and programs.
- g) Identifying possible staff liaisons to diverse populations.
- 7. Agrees that to the extent practicable, the project(s) will provide workforce education and training, contractor and job opportunities for disadvantaged communities (PRC §80001(b)(5)).
- 8. Certifies that the grantee shall not reduce the amount of funding otherwise available to be spent on parks or other projects eligible for funds under this division in its jurisdiction. A one-time allocation of other funding that has been expended for parks or other projects, but which is not available on an ongoing basis, shall not be considered when calculating a recipient's annual expenditures. (PRC §80062(d)).
- 9. Certifies that the grantee has reviewed, understands, and agrees to the General Provisions contained in the contract shown in the Procedural Guide; and
- 10. Delegates the authority to the (designated position, not name of person occupying position), or designee to conduct all negotiations, sign and submit all documents, including, but not limited to applications, agreements, amendments, and payment requests, which may be necessary for the completion of the grant scope(s); and

11. Agrees to comply with all applicable federal, state and local laws, ordinances, rules, regulations and guidelines.	1



#### REPORT BACKGROUND

The project statistics have been calculated based on half mile radius around the point location selected. Only park acres within the project area's half mile radius are reported.

Population and people in poverty are calculated by determining the percent of any census block-groups that intersect with the project area. The project area is then assigned the sum of all the census block-group portions. An equal distribution in census block-groups is assumed. Rural areas are calculated at a census block level to improve results.

Median household and per capita income are calculated as a weighted average of the census block- group values that fall within the project area. More information on the calculations is available on the methods page.
